


## DIFFERENT PARTS OF A TENNIS COURT



**BASELINE:** The lines at the far ends of the court, parallel to the net. Players serve from behind the baseline must not hit over it during rallies.


**SERVICE LINE:** The line that runs parallel to the net and is midway between the baseline and the net. It marks the boundary of the service boxes.






**CENTER SERVICE LINE:** The line that runs perpendicular to the net and divides the service boxes into left and right halves.

**SERVICE BOXES:** The two rectangular areas on either side of the center service line where serves must land. There are four service boxes in total, two on each side of the net.





## DIFFERENT PARTS OF A TENNIS COURT



**DOUBLES SIDLINE:** The outermost lines running along the length of the court, marking the boundary for doubles matches.

**SINGLES SIDELINE:** The inner lines running parallel to the doubles sidelines. These lines mark the boundary for singles matches.





**NET:** The net divides the court into two equal halves and stands 3 feet high at the center and 3.5 feet high at the posts. Players must hit the ball over the net during rallies.

**CENTER MARK:** A small line extending from the middle of the baseline towards the court, used to guide the server's position during serves.
